School trips

We set up a new system this year for paying trips in 3 installments to make it more manageable for parents. Each big trip (travelling outside of our local area) costs approximately £25 per child to pay for entrance fees and coaches. School subsidies this but we do need contributions from parents.

Reception pay 3 x Trip Contributions of £5 per year only (total £15)

Y1 – 6 pay 3 x Trip Contributions of £6.50 per year only (total £19.50).

Trip payments are due November, February and May.

Currently, there are still not enough families making the contributions. If this continues, we will not be able to do any 'big' trips next year at all.

School Fund

We ask for termly payments of £2 per child towards school fund.

This is to cover extra treats for the children, such as theatre performances and workshops.

Any payments, must be made via SQuid. Please speak to the office if you need assistance.

Reading together with your child matters!

Sharing books makes a big difference to your child's education.

When you read to your child you are making a positive impact on your child's reading ability and their love of reading.

Reading a book and chatting about it has a positive impact on your child's ability to:

- understand words and sentences
- use a wide range of vocabulary
- · develop listening comprehension skills


Reading books your child has chosen to read for pleasure is one of the best things you can do to help them succeed at school.

Books going home - a reminder





Please encourage your children to read at home every day! Book bags and reading records should be brought in every day!

We have set a school target of **75%** of our pupils reading at least 4 times a week at home.

Our current percentage is 65%.

Each week the children will bring home two books to read.

- A reading for pleasure book chosen by them.
 This is not matched to their reading ability so this is a book you can read to them.
- 2. A phonics/ book band book matched to their reading ability. This is a book they can read independently.
